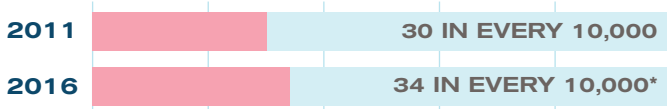

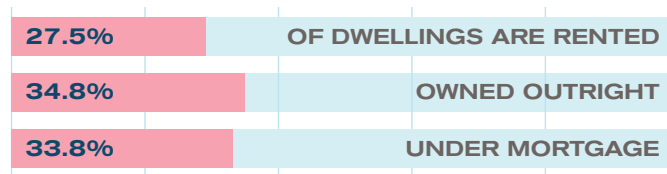

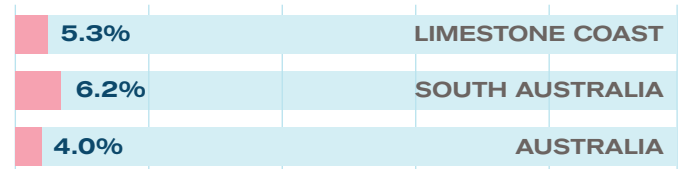

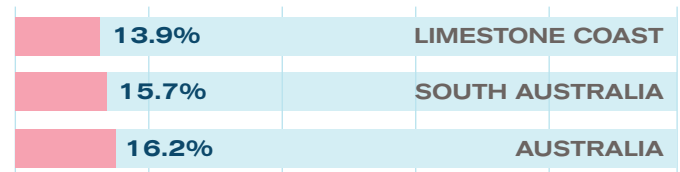
RENTING V OWNER-OCCUPIED

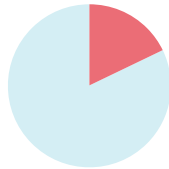

FOOD RELIEF FOR THE VULNERABLE

LIMESTONE COAST HOME HAMPER DELIVERY PROGRAM

When the global COVID-19 pandemic hit, Foodbank Limestone Coast quickly adapted its distribution model and provided 140 food hampers to people in need within 48 hours of receiving the order.

The Home Hamper Delivery program provided food to many families who were isolated, had limited supply of food in their town, or simply didn't have the necessary funds to access food.

Thanks to funding from one of our donors, the Stand Like Stone Foundation was able to make a real difference to people experiencing food poverty during an emergency.

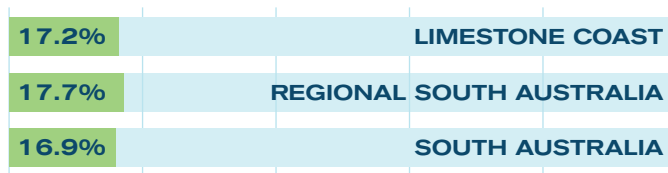

RESILIENCE TRAINING

The Junction is a not-for-profit mental health organisation, supporting people experiencing or recovering from mental illness.

The Resilience Training program provided Esher House Resilience Training and Equine Assisted Learning to community members with various disabilities and mental health issues such as post-traumatic stress disorder, anxiety, depression, drug and alcohol problems.

Thanks to funding from the OneFortyOne Community Grants program, the Stand Like Stone Foundation is helping people improve their mental health wellbeing.

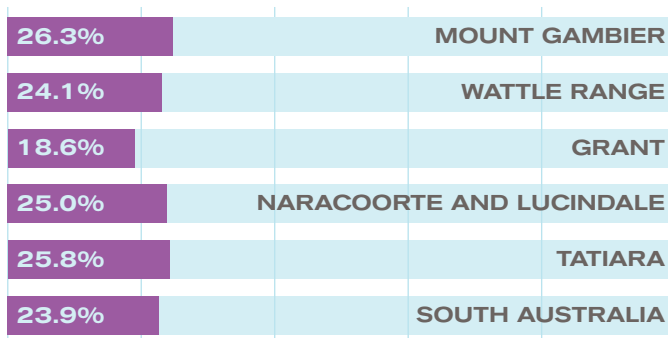
